GOSPEL

LK 23:35-43

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

Glory be to You, Lord.

The rulers sneered at Jesus and said, "He saved others, let him save himself if he is the chosen one, the Christ of God." Even the soldiers jeered at him. As they approached to offer him wine they called out, "If you are King of the Jews, save yourself." Above him there was an inscription that read, "This is the King of the Jews."

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us." The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal."

Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to You, Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Today's readings focus on the concept of kingship, particularly the Kingship of Christ Jesus. The First Reading declares the joy of the Israelites as they come to David and they crown and anointed him their king. The Responsorial Psalm likewise proclaims the joy of those who are on the way to the city of King David. St. Paul, in his letter to the Colossians, exults and exalts Jesus as co-creator, redeemer, and royal ruler of the Reign of GOD, His Abba-Father. The Gospel informs us that Jesus is crucified because He claims that He is the King. Although most ridicule His kingship, Jesus promises a place in His heavenly reign to the repentant criminal who is crucified with Him.
