GOSPEL

MT 4:12-17

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Glory be to You, Lord.

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested,

he withdrew to Galilee.

He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea,

in the region of Zebulun and Naphtali,

that what had been said through Isaiah the prophet

might be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun and land of Naphtali,

the way to the sea, beyond the Jordan,

Galilee of the Gentiles,

the people who sit in darkness have seen a great light,

on those dwelling in a land overshadowed by death

light has arisen.

From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say,

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand."

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to You, Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Our readings speak about a light shining upon those in darkness. The light brings hope of better days, of the fulfillment of the Reign of GOD. The light empowers the people to do whatever GOD is asking them to do. In the First Reading the people of the North sense a light which scatters the gloom in which they were living. The Responsorial Psalm reminds us that the LORD is our light. In the Second Reading, St. Paul reminds the faithful of Corinth that they should not be separating themselves into groups which claim allegiance to the human instrument who helped to bring about their enlightenment, but that they should realize that all the human agents are acting on behalf of GOD, Who is the One Who has called them into the Light — a new and closer relationship with GOD. In the Gospel, Jesus fulfills the prophecy in the First Reading of being the Light which shines on the people of the North.
