GOSPEL MT 21:28-32

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people:

"What is your opinion? A man had two sons. He came to the first and said, 'Son, go out and work in the vineyard today.' He said in reply, 'I will not, ' but afterwards changed his mind and went. The man came to the other son and gave the same order. He said in reply, 'Yes, sir, 'but did not go. Which of the two did his father's will?" They answered, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Amen, I say to you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you. When John came to you in the way of righteousness, you did not believe him; but tax collectors and prostitutes did. Yet even when you saw that, you did not later change your minds and believe him."

GOSPEL REFLECTION

In the Gospel, Jesus shares the story of the two children of a parent who requests that the offspring participate and help out in the family business. One responds affirmatively to the request, but later changes his mind and does not do what was asked of him. The other responds negatively, but similarly changes his mind and ends up fulfilling the parent's bidding. Each had a change of heart and did the opposite of what he had originally said he was going to do.

As I reflect on these readings I realized that each of us is responsible for not only our words of choice, but also our actions. Centering my thoughts on the Gospel, I realized that Jesus presents not the extremes of black and white, but the grey areas in between. Most of us live in the grey areas. One extreme would have been an obedient child who not only says that she/he will do the request of the parent, but actually does it. That offspring, like Jesus Himself, would always be dedicated to doing the will of the parent. The other extreme would be the child who refuses to do the will of the parent and lives out that decision in her/his very action (or more accurately, inaction). Neither of the two extremes explain where most of us find ourselves. Most of us, during times in our lives, have said one thing and done another. We have free will and we exercise that free will, even after saying one thing, we can, and often, do something else.

GOD respects our freedom of choice. GOD does not force us into acting one way or another. Yes, GOD asks us to do the divine will. Sometimes we say "yes" but do not fulfill our affirmative response. Other times we say "no" and later regret our response and do what is expected of us. Most often, our actions show where our real heart is. Yet, how much more Christ-like it would be if we could respond affirmatively in both word and in action.
