GOSPEL

MK 12:41-44

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to St. Mark.

Glory be to You, Lord.

Jesus sat down opposite the treasury and observed how the crowd put money into the treasury. Many rich people put in large sums.

A poor widow also came and put in two small coins worth a few cents. Calling his disciples to himself, he said to them,

"Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth,

but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had,

her whole livelihood."

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Jesus turns the attention to a widow who comes into the Temple and faithfully offers a couple copper coins. Jesus comments that she has given more than anyone because she, like the widow in the First Reading, was willing to give all she had, trusting in the protection and providence of GOD.

Today's readings are challenging for me. I ask myself, "do I trust as much as the two widows in the readings today?" Yes, I believe in GOD's providence, yet I also seem to have a need to hold onto things — just in case. I also ask myself, "Do I give enough to the ministry of the church?"

I think a key ingredient in the process is the trust we place in the Lord Jesus and His Abba-Father. The two widows (one a supposed non-believer and the other a believer) were willing to trust that GOD would provide for them. Trusting in GOD's providence means moving forward, not spending time worrying about what comes next. Trust does not lessen our need to think and act fully, but it lessens our concerns about what lies ahead. If we trust GOD, we can act confidently, yet not self-righteously like the religious leaders mentioned in the first part of the Gospel. The confidence is placed in GOD's love and care for us, not in our own importance. Placing our trust in GOD makes us shift our attention away from ourselves to focusing on others and our call to bring GOD's GOOD News in action and words to others.
