GOSPEL JN 18:33B-37

Glory be to You, Lord.

Pilate said to Jesus,

"Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own or have others told you about me?" Pilate answered, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests handed you over to me. What have you done?" Jesus answered, "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here." So Pilate said to him, "Then you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say I am a king. For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

GOSPEL REFLECTION

This celebration of Christ the King comes at the end of the liturgical year. It is the "crown" of the year in that it summarizes what has been celebrated all year and it looks forward to the Reign of Christ at the end of time. The First Reading describes the coming of the one Who is like the "Son of Man" who receives everlasting dominion over all. The psalm proclaims the LORD to be King surrounded by glory. The reading from the Book of Revelation describes Jesus as the Ruler of Kings and the One Who has made us into a Reign of priests (people who can help sanctify others by the way we serve and minister to them). In the Gospel today, as Jesus stands before the judgment seat of Pilate, He announces that He is King, but that His Kingdom is not of this world.

As we complete another liturgical year, we celebrate the Reign of the Lord Jesus which was begun through Jesus' life, ministry, death, and resurrection, but will not reach its completion until Jesus returns at the end of time to take final control of all peoples, nations, and life. We are living in the "already, but not yet" time of the Reign of Jesus the King.

It is sometimes hard for us as Americans to full grasp the concept of kingship, since we live in a democratic society. We find it hard to comprehend the full authority and power of a royal ruler who has ultimate power and control, and demands total allegiance and unquestionable obedience, and in return, provides protection and livelihood for the members of the Realm. It is important for us to realize that Jesus is even more of sovereign leader Who expects complete compliance. Yet He is also compassionate and understanding, having walked among us, and was subjected to others' authority. Jesus rules by serving others and taking care of their needs.
