GOSPEL LK 18:9-14

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke.

Glory be to You, Lord.

Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else.

"Two people went up to the temple area to pray; one was a Pharisee and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself, 'O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity -- greedy, dishonest, adulterous -- or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income.' But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.' I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

GOSPEL REFLECTION

In the Gospel, Jesus presents a parable to those who proudly think that they are above the rest of humanity. According to Jesus' telling of the parable, two individuals enter the Temple to pray. The first one is a Pharisee who boastfully sees himself better than all other people, especially better than the sinful tax collector. After all, the Pharisee publicly does everything by the letter of the law so that he can be admired for his righteousness. The Pharisee does not really need GOD's help since he is already justified in his own mind. Yes, it would be nice if GOD would agree with him, but even that is not necessary. The tax collector on the other hand humbly and contritely admits that he is in need of GOD's help and forgiveness. He is a sinner who needs GOD's spiritual healing. He can honestly confess that he is not perfect and wants a better relationship with GOD.

As I reflect on the readings, I am challenged to look at my own relationship with GOD – my prayer life – and see what is my attitude when I enter the presence of the Lord Jesus through prayer. At times I have come with an attitude of superiority and self-righteousness. I have turned to GOD in prayer, hoping that GOD would pat me on the back and say, "Great job!" My attitude has been prideful. I figure that I am doing GOD a favor by my turning to the Lord Jesus in prayer. I have been no better than the arrogant Pharisee in the parable.
