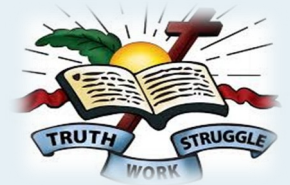

READING 1

A reading from the Book of Exodus.

The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, "This month shall stand at the head of your calendar; you shall reckon it the first month of the year. Tell the whole community of Israel: On the tenth of this month every one of your families must procure for itself a lamb, one apiece for each household. If a family is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join the nearest household in procuring one and shall share in the lamb in proportion to the number of persons who partake of it. The lamb must be a year-old male and without blemish. You may take it from either the sheep or the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, and then, with the whole assembly of Israel present, it shall be slaughtered during the evening twilight. They shall take some of its blood and apply it to the two doorposts and the lintel of every house in which they partake of the lamb.

EX 12:1-8, 11-14

That same night they shall eat its roasted flesh with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. "This is how you are to eat it: with your loins girt, sandals on your feet and your staff in hand, you shall eat like those who are in flight.

It is the Passover of the LORD. For on this same night I will go through Egypt, striking down every firstborn of the land, both man and beast, and executing judgment on all the gods of Egypt—I, the LORD! But the blood will mark the houses where you are. Seeing the blood, I will pass over you; thus, when I strike the land of Egypt, no destructive blow will come upon you. "This day shall be a memorial feast for you, which all your generations shall celebrate with pilgrimage to the LORD, as a perpetual institution."

GOSPEL

JN 13:1-15

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to John.

Glory be to You, Lord.

Before the feast of Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to pass from this world to the Father. He loved his own in the world and he loved them to the end. The devil had already induced Judas, son of Simon the Iscariot, to hand him over.

So, during supper, fully aware that the Father had put everything into his power and that he had come from God and was returning to God, he rose from supper and took off his outer garments. He took a towel and tied it around his waist. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and dry them with the towel around his waist. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Master, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered and said to him, "What I am doing, you do not understand now, but you will understand later." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered him, "Unless I wash you, you will have no inheritance with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Master, then not only my feet, but my hands and head as well." Jesus said to him, "Whoever has bathed has no need except to have his feet washed, for he is clean all over; so you are clean, but not all." For he knew who would betray him; for this reason, he said, "Not all of you are clean."

So when he had washed their feet and put his garments back on and reclined at table again, he said to them, "Do you realize what I have done for you? You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am. If I, therefore, the master and teacher, have washed your feet, you ought to wash one another's feet. I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do."

GOSPEL REFLECTION

Maundy Thursday draws us into the sacred beginning of the Paschal Triduum - the three most solemn days of the Church year. Tonight, we enter into the mystery of Christ's love made visible in a profound and tangible way. In the Upper Room, Jesus gathers with His disciples not only to celebrate the Passover, but to transform it. What had been a remembrance of liberation from Egypt now becomes the living reality of a new and eternal covenant.

At the Last Supper, Jesus gives Himself completely. Taking bread, He declares it to be His Body, broken and given for us. Taking the cup, He offers His Blood, poured out for the forgiveness of sins. In this moment, the Eucharist is instituted - the enduring presence of Christ among His people. This is not merely a symbol, but a real participation in His self-giving love. Each time we gather at the altar, we are drawn into that same mystery, that same sacrifice, that same communion.

On this holy night, the Church also remembers the institution of the priesthood. When Jesus commands, "Do this in memory of me," He entrusts the apostles with the sacred responsibility of continuing His sacrifice and making His presence real in the Eucharist. Through the priesthood, Christ remains actively present in His Church, offering Himself again and again for the life of the world. This gift calls us to pray for our priests, to support them, and to recognize in their ministry not merely a human role, but a participation in the very mission of Christ the High Priest.

Yet, the Gospel of this night also presents another essential dimension of discipleship: service. Jesus, the Master and Lord, kneels before His disciples and washes their feet. This act overturns every human expectation of power and authority. It reveals that true greatness in the Kingdom of God is found in humility, in self-emptying love, and in concrete acts of care for others. "As I have done for you, you should also do," He tells us.

As the liturgy moves toward the quiet of the altar of repose, we are invited to remain with Jesus - not only in the glory of the Eucharist, but also in the solitude of His coming agony. This night holds both intimacy and sorrow, gift and sacrifice. It asks us not only to receive, but also to stay, to watch, and to love.

The personal question/action for today:

Do I truly recognize the gift of the Eucharist as Christ giving Himself to me? How am I called to imitate His humility and service in my daily life? Am I willing to stay with Him in prayer, especially in moments of silence and sacrifice?
